FROM THE DIRECTOR

We are coming to the close of another year, and all of us are wondering where the time has gone. I guess that is a good thing. Reviewing the year and its record of accomplishments assures us it has been a good thing. The following listings will give you an idea of some of our activities.

- Monthly over 500 people come to the Center for one or the other of the services we offer.

- Since June of 2005, we have brokered 8 homes within our targeted area. We have seven families credit ready and on the waiting list for a home.

- Partnership with the Milwaukee Health Department continues to grow and develop. Through our contract with them, our lead abatement organizer, **Shonia Zollicoffer** has encouraged all neighborhood families to have their children lead tested. She has reached families by going door to door, visiting schools, churches and day care units to get out the message of the enormity of the lead poisoning problem. Of the thirteen applications for new lead free windows, seven have been completed. Shonia has also helped seven families submit NIP applications, with two of them approved. In addition the Health Department is working with us in conjunction with WE Energies so that residents can benefit from the WE Energy weatherization program. Their program involves assistance with furnaces, hot water heaters, insulation and lead free windows.

- The First Saturday resource meetings are continuing to attract many new members. More and more we realize how our mission: "To create a safe, beautiful neighborhood where people are well educated and well employed", is a rallying point for the community. In addition to the Center's meetings, a satellite group of neighborhood homeowners meets weekly in an effort to strengthen community in the neighborhood and to make

certain that residents have a strong voice in neighborhood development. On July 1, they will sponsor a fair with the theme, *Families United in '06*. They are planning on an attendance of over 300. The Dominican Center is a sponsor for that event.

- Under the direction of **Tess Gallun**, a UWM Documentary Film Class has produced a great piece of work. Their ten minute documentary has caught well the spirit and mission of the Center. The focus of the documentary is the renovation of the home that the Center purchased on 2975 North 21st Street. The home will be sold to one of our constituents. This filmmaking marks the fourth collaboration we have had with UWM students and faculty. The partnership began with a chance visit of **Professor Jacques DuPlessis** to the Center's Resale shop. He liked what he saw and heard about the Center, so he invited us to be the recipient of the community service aspect of his classes. It's been a win win situation ever since.

- Our students continue to accomplish much. **Doris Gant** and **Jackie Williams** have received their GED. Jackie was hired at St. Ann's Intergenerational Care Center almost immediately after her graduation in December. Recently, she was chosen May employee of the month. **Stephanie Sow** was chosen to represent Hephatha Church at a recent city wide Lutheran synod meeting. **Rochelle Jones** was also hired at St. Ann's.

It is always a special event. **Lydia Johnson** was honored to have her essay chosen to be printed in MATC's "Readers Writers" Program. Congratulations, Lydia.

• From July 10th - 14th, we are looking forward to welcoming nineteen teams from Catholic Heart Workcamp. The teams will be assisting homeowners in the neighborhood with a host of activities: gardening, painting, building, cleaning out, cleaning up, and whatever else needs to be done. Also this summer **Sister Sue** will again be working in partnership with Hephatha Church work ministry program. They will beautify the neighborhood by planting flowers in the gardens of those who request them. In addition they will do a weekly clean up of the neighborhood.

AN INTERVIEW WITH GEORGNIANA BOND

In an interview with Dominican Center Student **Georgniana Bond**, staff member **Carl Quindel** discovered the inspirational story of a woman's quest for knowledge. Her journey finally brought her to the Dominican Center roughly a year ago after speaking with a friend about her desire to return to school and learn how to read. Her friend mentioned the Dominican Center as a place that offered this type of opportunity. On Monday after last year's Memorial day, Georgniana walked into the Dominican Center and met with **Sister Ann Halloran**. Georgniana found the Center to be "a spiritual place", and she "thanks God for it".

According to Georgniana, her story began long before a year ago and not even in Milwaukee. "I grew up on a plantation in Mississippi and never had an opportunity to go to school," she explains. "The Civil Rights marches helped out a bit so that my younger brothers and sisters could take advantage of busing and good schools. I remember them being able to ride the yellow bus to get to the better schools. Before the buses, we all walked to a school, which was a part of the plantation." The plantation

school never compared to the education provided at the surrounding schools. When Georgniana ended up in Milwaukee about 40 years ago, she realized how important riding that yellow bus would have been. "When

I got here, I couldn't even spell my own name," she sadly remembers.

Her goals now are to earn her high school diploma at the age of 69. She also has begun writing memoirs of her experience in Mississippi and hopes to turn these into a book. In her first written piece she reflects on her time on the plantation, "The white children went to school all year long. They were the ones who rode the yellow buses, while we were in the field working... none of us was able to go to school until the crops were gathered." When those at the Center urged her to start writing her memories down on paper, she thought it might be too painful, but "it did [her] good to talk about her upbringing and how [she] really had no schooling growing up." What she did have, was common sense and a lot of respect for her mother and father, who helped her through rough times with prayer and faith "that one day [they] were going to overcome".

When asked about her typical day at the Center, she elaborated, "Some days, I only do math, other days I read, and when **Dorothy [Daniel]** is here we read the Bible and talk about it...I love the Dominican Center. I now know how to come in and get busy working by myself." Since she started coming to the Center, Georgniana learned to read and when she thinks about all she has accomplished, she seems astonished at where she is today, noting that "by God's grace, I have come a long way."
